"What's So Important About Bats?" at the Montana House November 10, 2012

The Montana House and the Glacier National Park Fund are pleased to co-host a presentation by Lisa Bate, wildlife biologist for Glacier National Park. She will discuss current findings of the Waterton-Glacier International Peace Park Bat Inventory and Monitoring Project initiated in 2011. The event will be at 4 pm Saturday afternoon, November 10th at the Montana House in Apgar Village.

Bate will include information on the ecological importance of bats, why bats are such a focus in research these days, and how biologists survey for bats. Lisa currently oversees the wildlife monitoring program along the Going-to-the-Sun Road during its reconstruction phase, bat and bird monitoring throughout the park, and oversees the Glacier National Park research projects on bats and harlequins ducks. Prior to her employment at GNP, Lisa worked as a private research wildlife biologist focusing mainly on birds, cavity-nesting species, and their habitat.
